Our Food Pantry Is Growing Faster Than Ever!

Thanks to the amazing dedication and leadership from Mark & Mandy S. and Ed H., our food pantry is growing faster and serving more people than anyone could have dreamed was possible. It's difficult to believe how far we've come in the past three months since the idea was first floated for consideration.

During the month of June, we averaged **20+ clients representing 75+ hungry mouths at home** *each week*. We're feeding 300 people!

As we anticipated, we are steadily achieving incremental improvements as we continue learning by watching other pantries in action, trying new ideas, and refining our processes each week.

It turns out that Mark S. is an expert at learning the price of every grocery item at every store in town. He knows what's on sale and if "buying in bulk" is really a good deal. Consequently, we're getting the most value from every penny we spend.

Mark is also our top "salesman." With bold humility, he has approached numerous businesses in Susanville explaining what we're doing and asking if they would like to support us. And have they ever! **Our corporate partners include** Grocery Outlet, Morning Glory, IGA, Walmart, Safeway, Ken's Appliances, and Lassen County Public Health, Oral Health Program.

Mandy S. nearly wore her sneakers out walking around

town, introducing herself to the managers of local motels and apartment complexes. They were all happy to learn about our food pantry and offered to give our flyers to people they know need help.

And Ed H. is one of many voices calling the *Swap Shop* radio show to let listeners know who we are, what we're doing, and letting folks know that anyone who needs food is welcome at our pantry.

Meanwhile, Pastor Charles continues managing our social media presence which currently includes both Facebook and Instagram (YouTube is the next step). A recent Facebook post reached over 1,000 people without us spending a dime. That's amazing!

Cal-Nev Annual Conference Working Hard To Keep Us Safe

We all miss worshipping together while being surrounded by the amazing stained glass in our sanctuary. Our Worship Team is working closely with our Annual Conference to ensure that, as we plan to resume in-person worship services, our processes and procedures will be in full compliance with all federal, state, local, and denominational requirements & recommendations.

We plan to resume in-person worship August 2nd at 10:00 am, but that could change based on numerous factors.

Currently, we plan to have worship outside in the walkway between the Social Hall and the Sanctuary. Being outside dramatically reduces the risk of cross-contamination and infection.

We are taking every precaution to ensure we are following John Wesley's "3 Rules" which are 1) do no harm, 2) do good, and 3) stay in a loving relationship with God. To that end, the following procedures will be in place for in-person worship (inside or outside).

Before entering the worship space, our greeters will check your temperature, spray your hands with sanitizer, and offer you a disposable mask.

Proper use of masks (i.e. covering both mouth and nose) is required at all times. This is non-negotiable.

Our ushers will escort you to designated seats. People currently living

together can sit together in pairs. Seating will be assigned on a first-come, first-served basis.

In case inclement weather occurs during our outdoor worship service, we will direct everyone to move into the Social Hall where chairs will be spaced six feet apart.

A generosity box will be available if you would like to bring a cash or check donation. We will also have our Square credit card reader available in case you'd like to use that option.

At the end of worship, our ushers will direct people to leave, one at a time. There will be no social hour at the end of worship. Please exit directly to your car.

If we are able to continue worshipping inperson as the weather becomes cooler, we will move into the Sanctuary.

Please note: To reduce the risk of contamination and infection, we will *not* sing hymns together nor have unison speaking (e.g. the Lord's Prayer). Feel free to hum quietly during songs and whisper words normally said in unison.

If for any reason, you do not wish to worship with us in person, you can continue worship with us online. If we worship in-person on Sunday, we will **also** offer an online Zoom worship service Sunday evenings at 6:00 pm. These online services will be very similar to what we have done since March.

> Please take this warning seriously: An unavoidable risk of exposure to and contracting COVID-19 (aka the corona virus) exists anywhere people are or have been present. COVID-19 is an extremely contagious disease that can lead to severe illness, disability, and death. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), senior citizens and guests with underlying medical conditions are especially vulnerable. Although our church has instituted reasonable practices in an attempt to reduce the spread of COVID-19, we cannot guarantee that you will not catch nor succumb to the virus. By attending events on our property, you voluntarily assume all risks related to COVID-19.

For nearly 300 years, Methodists around the world have been inspired and led by John Wesley's response to God's call: "Here am I; send me!" (Isaiah 6:8). "Send me into the world to be salt and light" (Matthew 5:13-16).

To guide early followers of the Methodist movement, Wesley provided three simple, allpurpose rules which modern Methodists often summarize as: 1) do no harm, 2) do good, and 3) stay in a loving relationship with God.

UMC Deacon Rev. Charlie Baber wrote this short essay on John Wesley's 3 General Rules. Let's all work to include these "rules" into our church meetings as well as our daily lives.

And let's discuss them. How do they apply? How are they helpful guides? How can we use them to shape our decision making in matters both large and small? The "rules" can help us incorporate our faith into our personal and professional lives in practical ways.

You can read all of Wesley's thoughts on the three rules in the UMC's 2016 Book of Discipline: ¶ 104. Section 3 – Our Doctrinal Standards and General Rules: The General Rules of The Methodist Church (pgs. 77-80). ~ Pastor Charles



Grace and responsibility are key components of Wesleyan Christianity. For John Wesley, God's grace must have practical application. In other words, grace is not an idea, but a free gift and experience we can cultivate through practices designed by God. Since the Protestant Reformation, we have often pitted the Law against the Gospel, as if there is no grace at work in the rules God lays out throughout scripture. And yet Jesus explains that the entire Law can be summed up in this: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, soul and strength, and love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:35-40) The Law of Love can be summed up in that, yes, but it is spelled out in the actual study and practice of the biblical law. For Wesley, the rules are not there to regulate our living, but are God's grace freely given to us to live whole and happy lives.

The Methodist movement began not just with passionate personal encounters with God's

presence, but with a desire to live holy lives shaped by God's covenant with us. As John Wesley noticed some of the early Methodist societies becoming more lax in their expectations for holy living, he gave them some VERY specific "general" rules. The summary that made the rules general is simple enough: **Do no harm, Do good, Attend upon all the ordinances of God.**

But under each of those were very specific practices that Wesley believed were applications of Scriptural holiness in his people's context. This was intended to teach the people that **theology had practical implications in the ways they lived their lives.** Anyone who consistently failed to check off enough of these rules would be asked to leave the Methodist societies until they were ready to take it more seriously. [This was a big deal back in the late 1700s.]

"Do no harm" is a pretty generic bumper sticker sort of Christianity. But in Wesley's societies, it meant "no buying or selling of slaves" (before abolition was even a concept). It meant "no conversations that are meant to tear others down," including the way we talk about our politicians. It meant asking one another very personal things like: "have you been buying luxuries for yourself instead of helping the poor."

"Do good" got into the incredibly specific questions of "how have you shown mercy to the bodies and souls of the poor?"

"Attending upon all the ordinances of God" was Wesley's peculiar way of saying "practice the means of grace." These are the specific practices God has [created] for us to experience grace, such as in corporate worship, taking the sacraments, prayer and scripture study, and fasting.

For Wesley, following the rules for the sake of following rules means nothing, and yet a person may still be surprised by God's grace. No, the purpose of committing to a rule of life is much like following a recipe (at least, for those of us who enjoy cooking). It can just serve as a guideline to get a result, or it can be something that can be followed and enjoyed almost as much as eating the final dish.
